

A 'Sailing We Will Go

IT is a fact of simple geography, often bemoaned by local holidaymakers, that Northampton and its environs are just about as far from the sea as it is possible to get anywhere in Britain.

But a resolution passed at last week's meeting of the Mid-Northamptonshire Water Board means that no longer will this distance from the sea represent a handicap for those who would enjoy that away-from-it-all sport - boat-sailing.

For the Water Board, after many months of careful deliberation, have at last set their official seal of approval to long-laid plans for Pitsford Reservoir, now nearing completion, to become a venue for sailing.

Even before last week's announcement, scores of people have evinced close interest, in the possibility of sailing on the reservoir, and the organising committee, which kept matters going until the club could be properly constituted, have all the names carefully filed.

And now that the official go-ahead has been received, these people - and many more who fancy their chances at the helm of a boat on the reservoir - will be wondering just what the costs of this sport will be.

The facts are simple - and rather surprising. As Britain's leading sailing boat designer, Uffa Fox, has said : "If you can afford a television set, you can buy a boat and go sailing."

The enthusiasts behind the club make no secret of their determination to train their members to take their place with the country's best. Indeed, they believe that they have, at Pitsford, waters where some of Britain's international and Olympic helmsmen of the future may have their first introduction to the sport.

Dear Editor, I feel compelled to write the following, I am quite happy for you to publish, if you see fit:

Many more people would go racing if we got rid of this "handicap/pursuit racing" situation, it is dull, uninteresting and better suited to mathematicians than racers. People like to go home knowing their position in a race. We need fleet racing. The membership needs to vote to retain 8 to 10 favoured classes (something for everyone). It would be vital that the 8-10 classes should be decided by a temporary committee of members (social or full) each with at least twenty years of dinghy racing experience. When the classes are chosen, new members would have to sail one, existing members would have reasonable time to switch to a recognised class and remove their current boat from the site.

Failure to take action such as this will see the further demise of Northampton Sailing Club as witnessed at many, once great, clubs in the UK. On the other hand, by taking action, NSC should draw membership from clubs who are already beyond reprieve from problems caused by dilution and handicap/pursuit racing. There might be a mild financial pill to swallow in the short-term (some current members might leave to sail elsewhere) but beyond this, there could be financial gains in the medium/long term. Interestingly, I have witnessed smaller clubs (who are restricted by their water size as to the number of classes sailed), positively thrive over the last few years.

A phenomenon within the sport over the last 15 years has seen national dilution of fleets due to the so called "new classes" appearing and often failing. Frankly, as a social member, I walk around the boat park and see dozens of classes, some of which I don't recognise, nearly all of which are rarely sailed. The majority of boats at NSC sit in the boat park, a very sad sight indeed.

Fleet racing breeds enthusiasm, it also encourages healthy transfer of knowledge, equipment and expertise within each fleet. Handicap racing encourages people to sail a boat with a favourable PY number.

In the days when classes were limited at NSC, the club was a great club, probably one of the best in the country (I've been a member of NSC, on and off since 1975). The obvious argument to this is that "dinghy sailing has diminished in the UK". Wrong, it has become more popular in recent times, more participants than before, unfortunately being diluted into too many classes.

I for one will not join as a full member until a vote/action as described above is instigated.

Northampton Sailing Club needs to wake up !

We are also looking for more ideas on improving our sailing club, be it on the water events, off the water socialising or even how the club structures its membership. Please pass your thoughts and ideas on to Carol Travers, Ian Castle, myself or any Committee member.

We are still struggling with lack of boat spaces so we intend to do an "Un-seaworthy" boat review. Members with "wrecks" on site will be asked to remove them. So if you have one please take it away before we get to inspect it! Remember it is a club rule that all boats on site must be able to pass a buoyancy test and if any fail they will have to be removed. Safety first....

Back in November, the Lord Lieutenant of Northamptonshire, Lady Juliet Townsend, wrote to me, asking if we would like to be considered for a visit by Princess Anne. Would we? Of course we would; we leapt at the opportunity! And so, the well-oiled machine that is our committee broke into a walk and started organising an 'ordinary' Sailability day out of season.

Tuesday 14th March dawned, presumably, but there was no sunshine and the rain that was forecast arrived at the same time as HRH. Her arrival was 50 years after her Grandmother, HM The Queen Mother, had opened Pitsford Reservoir and Northampton Sailing Club.

Despite the bad weather, Princess Anne brought the sunshine with her. 96 people had accepted the invitation and were there to meet and talk to her. Jenny Jeffs, Principal of our RTC, had organised a display of radio and navigation courses and HRH joined Mohammed Ameripour in playing with one of the new interactive CDs.

After circulating the groups of members in the lounge and galley, it was time to go outside to look at boats and sailors in action. Knowing that The Princess Royal is President of the RYA and that she knows a lot about Sailability, it was at this stage that I handed over to Georgina Taylor to discuss the boats we use and the activities in which we are involved. It was also raining quite hard!

I was privileged to ask HRH to name our second Martin 16 'Free Spirit'. This was bought with funds generously provided by a local charity, The Phillips Trust. Don't be confused by the photograph. 'Freespirit' was a typo by the name putters-on!

Phantom Open 17th - 18th June 2006 Will Gulliver

Saturday dawned sunny with a thermal breeze the racing started promptly at 1.00pm and almost immediately most of the fleet wished they hadn't bothered. As the thermal breeze fought for supremacy, at some point in the race almost all of the fleet would consider themselves in the lead as the fleet sailed from one calm patch to the next. In the end Will Gulliver was first across the line followed by Daren Pike & Simon Cowood.

The fleet spent the next couple of hours ashore watching the wind first fill in from one side of the lake followed by the other until thankfully racing was abandoned for the day.

Sunday started early to catch up with the program with a nice force 2 breeze. Andy Couch started well in the 2nd race and pulled away for a comfortable lead followed by John Wayling and a rapidly improving Gulliver.

The third race was sailed on windward leeward course and was led from start to finish by Will Gulliver followed by Andy Couch followed by John Wayling.

During the fourth race sailed directly after the previous 2 in a pleasant force 2-3 with occasional planing on the reaches. Gulliver led at the beginning but was passed by Couch downwind who went on to win however continually pushed by Gulliver all the way to the line, The ever consistent Wayling finished 3rd.

The final race started after a break for lunch both Gulliver & Couch had 2 first places & a second so the overall victor would be decided in the last race. It started in a similar force 2-3 breeze of the morning. Gulliver got away well and had a 30 meter lead at the first mark, with Couch in 3rd as the breeze started to drop steadily Couch reeled Gulliver in and by the third lap the 2 were neck & neck, somehow Gulliver held on downwind to lead round the final leeward mark only 100 meters from the line, in the tacking battle to the line Couch skilfully managed to put a club Solo between the warring parties, the final verdict from the photo on the line was that Couch had beaten Gulliver by 4 inches. Wayling again came in third after pulling through the fleet from an indifferent first beat.

Pitsford Pirate's representatives for this event were Sophie & Victoria Archer, Riley Harber, Ollie Brett, Matthew Brown and Jason Clarke. Jason, Ollie and Matthew were representing the club for the region, and Sophie, Victoria and Riley, who are newcomers to the sport, were competing in their first ever T15 event and together with Matthew, formed the Pitsford Pirate's team.

Carsington, was pleasantly windy and warm, so all being well it would be a full day of racing without too much pumping, and with everyone registered, kit rigged, and all courses set, the briefings were held, and the racing began around 11:15. The Pitsford group were sailing in 4 different fleets, so that meant that there were 3 courses to watch, as Jason, Ollie and Matthew were on the main course, competing in the Bic Techno 293 One Design 7.8 and 6.8 fleets, Riley on a course in the T15 5.5 open fleet, and Victoria and Sophie on the T15 3.5 open fleet course.

Unfortunately none of us got a prize, but we had a good time.
